





Glennagannon River Restoration

- Delivering a river restoration project using natural materials to build revetments, improve resilience to flooding
- Practical experience utilising skills gained in training
- Had previous experience with Wild Trout Trust on Culdaff River
- Application to LAWPRO for funding of €10,000





Project Plan

- Repair 4 sections of riverbank to prevent further erosion
- Install baffles on bridge apron to improve fish passage
- Install fencing to exclude livestock
- Plant trees to provide bank structure and increase infiltration
- Install pasture pumps for livestock





Installing Baffles






Increased depth over apron from average 5cm to 20cm in average flow











Outcomes

- 5x Brash collection events
- 7 days work 13 volunteers, 2 contractors
- 78m bank revetment
- 120m fencing (total 150m bank protected)
- 30 trees & 200 bulbs
- 2x pasture pumps
- baffles for fish passage



- Traps sediment
- Reducing instream sedimentation
- Reprofiling bank
- Reducing energy and creating gravel bars that are protecting the banks
- Providing habitat for fish & invertebrates


Benefits of Engaging Community




